



When Norm found God, he found a new way of living. But God had prepared Norm before he was born to **become** the kind of person He wanted him to **be**.



Norm was the first person in his family to get a college degree. He even got a doctorate at a time when that was very rare. Yet all the time he was studying, he could have thought of himself as *just a poor boy who could never learn to read*. So what was it that he believed about God that made him press on?



Grace reasoned that if she could not know about anything about reality, then she could not know God. Because our culture struggled with knowing reality, some Christians waivered in their view of truth and the Bible.

- What would keep God from communicating clearly and effectively to us?

The most influential result of the International Council on Biblical Inerrancy was the creation of the Chicago Statement on Biblical Inerrancy. This statement affirms the Bible's **trust**worthiness down to every single word of the original manuscripts.

"The Bible, as written by its original authors in the original manuscripts, is completely free from error: doctrinally, historically, and scientifically, both in its entirety and down to every single word."

Read 2 Corinthians 1. Can the Bible be truly God's word and have errors in the original writings? Can the Bible be true and not be true at the same time? Ask your pastor and one or more spiritual advisors for what answers they would give, or where they would point you to learn more.

This Week

Ask three Christians, "Do you believe that the Bible has errors?" If they say yes, ask them, "How do you decide which parts of the Bible are true?" If they say no, ask them, "What made you decide that it has no errors?"

Verses to Know

One of the qualities God developed in Norm was to be observant of the world around him, and to be curious about what he observed. The more he learned about what others **thought**, the more he asked, "Why do they **think** that?" God gave him insight as he compared these ideas with what he could **reason** about **reality**. Then Norm shared that **reason**ing with others, not so that he could seem superior, but because he wanted them to **know** God's **love**.

The confusion that developed in the late 20th century about how we could know reality made many Christians wary of talking with others about their faith. The work Norm did in talking about the existence and nature of **truth** and **reality** modeled a way for Christians to find common ground with others, no matter their beliefs. And from that common ground, they could begin to *co-journey* toward God's **love**.

That love is the **reason** why Jesus always welcomed questions. He often responded to questions with *more* questions. If their hearts were open, many times He allowed them to surface the **truth** for themselves (John 4:7-14). If their hearts were closed, like many religious leaders of His day, then He used a different approach. He came to earth to die a sacrificial death for everyone, including each person he talked with, because of his great love for them (Matt. 23:27-28).





Verses to Know

- I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing. (John 15:5)
- Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Therefore, my beloved, as you have always obeyed, so now, not only as in my presence but much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure. (Philippians 2:5-13)
- For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:6-8)

When we **know** who we are, because we **know** who God is, we can **know** it is God who qualifies us to become the kind of person He wants us to be. As Norm learned, "We cannot **know** ourselves **truly**, unless we **know** our God **truly**... The quest for ultimate satisfaction will never be fulfilled in anything less than the ultimate. That's why we need to **know** the **true** God."

- For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known. So now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love. (1 Corinthians 13:12-13)

- By this my Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be my disciples. As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full. This is my commandment, that you *love one another as I have loved you.* (John 15:8-12)


